

Changes at Northallerton and the Dales Mencap Society:

From its inception in 1964, The Northallerton and the Dales Mencap Society has seen several changes but has always worked to support people with learning disabilities, their families and carers. This work was taken on by Sue Lear, in support of the Trustees of the Society, on 1st December 1997.

Over the past 28+ years Sue, as Development Manager, has worked hard to ensure that the voice of people with learning disabilities has been heard, or represented, both locally and more widely. Sue has established the good reputation of this local Mencap so that, when issues relating to the needs of people with learning disabilities are being considered, the Society is consulted. In this regard, Sue played a vital role as Valuing People Coordinator for North Yorkshire County Council, as it was then, and, with NYCC staff, ran the North Yorkshire Learning Disability Partnership Board helping to transform provision for people with learning disabilities. Work on community safety, health issues and links with other organisations, such as Royal Mencap, the police and like-minded providers, has been effective in raising awareness of the needs of people with learning disabilities. Sue has also been a listening ear; many parents and carers have been grateful for her support. Sue's dedicated work was recognised more widely when she was awarded the British Empire Medal for her long and valued service.

Sue has now decided that it is time for her to retire and will be leaving her role at the end of March 2026. Trustees, and everyone involved with the Society, owe Sue a debt of gratitude and wish her a long and happy retirement. It is no exaggeration to say that the Society would not be where it is now without Sue's input; she will be missed.




